### From the Pastor's Desk

The Elder-Led committee has learned quite a bit in doing research on Elders in the church. Seven Baptist churches that have Elders in their leadership were questioned about how they functioned and the process of becoming Elder led. Most of the churches said they became Elder led because it is biblical. Most of the churches had men only in this role. Only one of the churches is still in the process of becoming Elder led. All of them support having Elders in the church. One of them appears to be Elder ruled.

[An Elder ruled church does not bring any decisions to the church for a vote. Elder led churches decide what decisions need to be brought to the church for a vote.]

The number of Elders varies from church to church. Some have a fixed number. Some allow for the number they have to either grow or shrink depending on the need. Most have a term for Elders to serve though at least one has Elders for life.

Each church has a process by which one may become an Elder. The qualifications are listed in 1 Timothy 3:1-7, 1 Timothy 5:17-18, 1 Timothy 5:19 and Titus 1:5-9. Their function according to scripture is:

- To teach sound (biblical) doctrine and refute false beliefs which threaten the faith of the church (Titus 1:9)
- To set a Christ-like example for believers to follow (1 Peter 5:3)
- To rebuke and address sinful conduct of fellow believers within the church (Galatians 6:1; 1 Timothy 5:20)
- To implement church discipline (1 Corinthians 5:5-11)
- To lead the church (1 Timothy 5:17)

Each church we have contacted takes the vetting of the Elders seriously. It is not a popularity contest. Many of the prospective Elders remove themselves from consideration because they believe they are not qualified.



## The XP Corner

Embracing Pruning in 2023. If you continue to add more and more and never prune, you are going to get unhealthy. Stuck churches have more ministries. Stuck churches have more events. Stuck churches have more staff. Stuck churches have more people in meetings rather than engaging the mission. If we always add but never prune, we will get out of shape and our ministry will not be healthy. When we don't practice pruning, eventually the briers and the thorns take over (Isaiah 5:6). So, what's the difference between pruning and unhealthy decline? Biblical pruning (John 15:2) has these three characteristics:

- 1. The pruning is intentional. If you're experiencing decline as a church that is not the result of intentional action you've taken, that's not pruning, that's decline.
- 2. Pruning involves both cutting back what's unhealthy and what's healthy. Churches are rarely willing to cut back good ministries that are producing some fruit, even though they could be preventing the church from maximizing its potential health and impact.

3. Pruning eventually produces more fruit. If your church is plateaued or declining, and that extends from months to years without new fruit and new health—you haven't experienced pruning, you're probably just stuck.

Why don't churches prune? Even if the pruning will ultimately help the church produce more fruit in the long-run, in many cases, leaders are unwilling to do it because of the fear of how people will respond. They fear that people will leave the church and that giving will decline.

It's true that having a clear vision will both attract and repel people. However, it's also true that it's not possible to grow a healthy church and ignore core Biblical principles, including the practice of pruning. Healthy, thriving churches have learned that periodically you have to prune. And if pastors and church leaders prune using the model we see in Scripture, your ministry will bear more fruit. Your church will get healthy again.

It matters not which season we are experiencing; I claim the current one my favorite. How could it be otherwise when there is much to see and learn from each? Of course, spring is an easy pick as a favorite, with the earth awakening and bringing forth new life. Summer rivals spring with varied shades of green accompanied by phusical growth and blooms. Fall then rivals both with amazing displays of gorgeous colors. Winter tends to be almost forgotten -mainly because I stay inside where it's warm and do not take the opportunity to observe. However, Arch and I had occasion to witness winter away from our usual Tidewater environs as we drove to Orange, on December 23rd. We frequently travel 460, partly to avoid the tunnel traffic, but more to see Virginia's farmland. We had driven that highway in May as we went camping for a weekend. Each tree "skeleton", sapling or mature, told its own story of growth, as well as of storms and There were broken limbs, split trunks, a winds in the past. permanent bend in the direction of the prevailing wind, or even felled trees that somehow had survived, sending branches straight up from the horizontal trunk.


As we drove up and down hills and around curves, the fields gave hints of the previous summer months. Shocks of brown cornstalks stood, some as straight as soldiers; others had blown over. Giant machines had denuded the cotton plants of their foliage and white bolls, leaving scraps of cotton fluttering in the breeze. Huge plastic bales lay in the fields, ready for processing. Further down the road several plots had been plowed, removing traces of their former fruit. All seemed drab brown or grau-until brilliant green fields came into view! In contrast to patches of freshly cultivated brown soil, the bright "spring green" of the six-inch winter wheat lent cheer—even brilliance— to the landscape.

I had once again been "surprised by joy". My heart rejoiced in the beauty of God's creation. The unfolding scenery reminded me of His plan for growth and renewal even in some of the more challenging seasons of life. Along our journeys we experience joy and sorrow, loss and pain, boredom and busy-ness, trials and change ... But most of all we know God's love and faithfulness as He preserves and blesses us in all seasons.
